

## 2020 THE ESTATE STUDIO PKA

In all likelihood Studio PKA's 21stcentury plan to revitalise Ballard Estate's public spaces would have made the district's master planner. Scottish architect George Wittet. ecstatic. The century-old business district on reclaimed land featured a series of breeze-welcoming and lightfiltering courtvards.1 into which the Mumbai-based studio sought to slip an array of landscape and pedestriancentric interventions, Amphitheatres, outdoor seating, cafes, accessible lawns, public toilets and a work plaza were just some of the gestures proposed to activate the otherwise abandoned oases, overrun with trash and rogue vegetation following decades of neglect.2 Twenty-footwide setbacks between dozens of Edwardian-style buildings - one of the generous spatial features which led the Bombay Port Trust in 1930 to

describe Wittet's scheme as "one of the finest business estates in the East" — were to become an inviting fusion of hardscape and softscape, with selected areas doubling as exhibition alleys displaying the work of local artists. Studio PKA's historically sensitive vision for the future was all set to make a splash when the Coronavirus pandemic swept the globe, forcing planned advocacy efforts onto the back-burner temporarily.


